Jackie Nitschke Center – Intensive Outpatient

- Green Bay, Wisconsin
- Funding Sources: 40% Center subsidized; 39% Insurance; 17% self pay; 4% government
- Adults only (18 years and older)
- Length of treatment: 6 weeks (18 three-hour sessions if start at IOP level of care); 4 weeks (12 three-hour sessions if start at residential level of care.) Note: 16 sessions of aftercare group therapy at no charge for everyone





Aims Addressed

❖Reduce days from first contact to the first treatment session

Reduce the no show rate





Why Is This A Problem?

- The wait for services is 8.3 days
- The window of motivation is small, and a longer wait misses this opening

Outpatient does not consistently operate at capacity

Changes made to address the aim:

- Added an extra counselor to do outpatient assessments
- Opened up more appointment slots
- Trained all staff on the use of the phone, and how to make intensive outpatient assessment appointments





One Key Event That Was Particularly Instrumental In Making This Project A Success

Entire staff was involved in training session for the project






Data Collection Challenges

Number of outpatient assessments per week is small resulting in one client situation throwing the data off

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Future Plans

- Explore training more counselors to do outpatient assessments
- Interview clients currently in the program to see what barriers they experienced in starting IOP
- Punch card for staff: Every time client gets started in under 4 days, the card is punched. Once get to 10 punches, all staff get four hours of personal time.
